seen – it has been so pleasing to see our current year 11 (recently left) meet the challenge of examinations head on with the support of our staff and, of course, our parents. We have great hopes for how they will do, in spite of the many challenges that exist post COVID. Thank you for all the support you have given them, and us, over the last five years!

This has also been a year of great positive change. We saw 190 pupils with us in September meaning the school exceeded 800 pupils for the first time in its history (rising to 840 in September 2023). This has meant the opening of new pupil toilets and an extension to our already fantastic canteen facilities pupils have been enjoying these all year. In the next few weeks, the second round of building begins giving us a new Pastoral Hub - housing a much bigger Bridge Unit and counselling rooms for pupils, along with a new Pastoral reception. This will provide enhanced support for pupils in an area that has been celebrated by pupils, staff and the wider community (including Estyn) multiple times. We look forward to next year's launch! That of course is in addition to the ongoing plans for a 3G pitch on site over the next few months.

There has been much to celebrate this year – in our last newsletter I reported on our Culture Week celebrations – we will be undertaking this again next year and look forward to our parents joining us again if they can. I am also pleased to say that our Year 11 boys have once again become the Welsh National Basketball Champions – beating much bigger schools all over Wales to take the crown. This means alongside Football and Rugby we are now a national centre for another key sport!

We have been fortunate to run many trips over the last few weeks – we have had visits to the Taylor Wimpey site for our construction pupils, community tree planting and litter picking, STEM Science events, Storey Arms and visits to St David's College and Cardiff Metropolitan University as part of our Aspirations Week. Aspirations Week also held Practice Interviews

for Year 10 and a Careers Fair – all around helping pupils make aspirational choices following their successful time here at Mary Immaculate.

Technology and innovation plus energy and transport. Lots of fun was had by all students and staff. Very much looking forward to returning to the fair next year.






In January, ten year 8 pupils attended a females in STEM day at St Davids College.

A very inspirational talk was given by a student from America who attends Massachusets Institute of Technology (MIT). She spoke about her journey through school and college, her interest in STEM subjects and how it has led her to getting her new job in New York. We then took part in a coding

competition with 3 other schools.... and we won! We finished our visit with a tour of St David's college.









Dr Mark Smith came in to speak to our year 9 and year 11 triple scientists in February about his work as a nuclear fusion physicist. He is part of the biggest nuclear fusion experiment in the world working to help develop Britains 1st fusion reactor (as opposed to fission which we already have) He spoke to the pupils about the doughnut shaped reactor that houses plasma travelling at a tenth of the speed of light.



Storey Arms 2023

In June, 33 of our Year 10 pupils headed to the Storey Arms for a residential weekend. Those that attended were current GCSE PE and Sport Coaching pupils in preparation for the practical activities they will experience later in the course- for some, contributing up their moderation.

Pupils travelled to the centre on the school and Storey Arms minibuses, these were also used to transport pupils between the various activity sites located across the beautiful Brecon Beacons. Whilst at the centre pupils were challenged with many chores including setting out and clearing tables before and after mealtimes, making their own packed lunches as well as cleaning and tidying their dorm rooms.

Mary Immaculate staff including Mr Camilleri, Miss Evans, Mr Wilson, Mr Hannah and Miss Barker took our pupils to oversee the weekend and participate. A Big thank you to all staff and pupils who were involved in this successful trip, it was a terrific and fun weekend for all.








Built Environment Visit Taylor Wimpey Building Site

In the morning, when we When we arrived we all met in the meeting room. Where we talked about health and safety on the site with the health and safety manager Jo. We also got opened up to opportunities of the jobs on the site and more in depth of the apprenticeship's available, by the apprenticeship manager Rob. After the talk, we all put on our our steel toe capped boots, hard hats, gloves and hi-visibilty vests. We then went to the compound where we split into groups and had demonstrations on how we use the cement and lay the bricks using a trowel by our instructor Liam.







After the demonstrations we started our tasks, our first task was to make a wall using the lightweight thermalight bricks and how we can utilize the brick jointer. Our second task was to use the heavier breeze block bricks to build a wall. Finally we used the smaller lightweight bricks to build a wall. After we had finished that, we had to clean up all the cement that had fallen on the floor using shovel then we had received our Taylor Wimpeys certificates. After that it had come to the end of the day where we took off our PPE and returned back to school again with the minibus.

Y11 Basketball Boys Crowned Welsh National Champions In Bangor

Is This basketball team the most successful school sports team in Wales? That's the question being asked after Mary Immaculate High School's Year 11 boys' basketball team were crowned U18 Welsh Basketball Champions for the second year in a row. The victory tops an outstanding few years for the boys, who have remained unbeaten since they were in Year 9.Adam Camilleri, PE teacher and head of basketball at the school said:

"It's one thing being able to perform at a high level against people your own age, but what these young men have achieved against teams much older than them is incredible. The dedication and passion they have for the sport is inspiring."

It's no fluke the boys are so successful, with Mr Camilleri explaining just how dedicated they are. "The boys get to school early every day to train from 7.30am to 8.30am without any help," explained Mr Camilleri. "They're constantly running plays, practicing patterns, and changing scenarios to meet the demands of a Welsh Finals tournament." Their victory is a testament to all their hard work and I could not be any prouder of them. "Jay Shorthall, the team's small forward, said he was delighted to be a double Welsh Champion.

"I'm so happy to be a part of this team," he said. "We found the semi-final difficult as Holyhead tried to counteract our

zone with clever plays. After a 'timeout' with Mr Camilleri and Mr Hannah, we calmed down, switched tactics, and went on to win the game. After that, it was about holding our nerve and continuing to trust each other – the result spoke for itself. "I'm so happy to be a double Welsh Champion and finish our school life on the highest of highs!"

Mary Immaculate won a total of eight games during the Cardiff Regionals and Southern Finals. The boys then progressed to the national final, which was held at Bangor University and saw them competing against players up to three years older than them. In the semi-final they beat Ysgol Uwchradd



Caergybi from Holyhead 31-12 before beating Bishop Gore School from Swansea 21-16 in the final.Mr Camilleri said the boys showed "incredible resilience and professionalism" and praised them for their "formidable defence" during the final.
