I know that lockdown put a lot of pressure on families – I want to thank you for your ongoing support in spite of the pressures we have all faced; I hope we have been able to support you and your children in the face of these difficulties.

I also want to thank our young people and families for the support regarding facemasks and safety around the site. Six months ago it would have been inconceivable to be using masks on site or ensuring year groups are kept separate. It is to their credit that pupils have worked with us all the way and adapted to this new way of working and being on site. The way pupils have also spoken on TV or radio shows about lockdown or exams shows what an incredible group they are – appearing on BBC Breakfast in the Summer and since then on the National (UK) TV news, numerous times on radio and of course many times in the press and online. They speak with such confidence and skill to make all of us proud.

To some extent this term, some normality has returned to school life. We were hugely pleased to see that Victoria Carey, our Head of English won the Secondary School Teacher of the Year. This is a great honour for her, her team and the school as a whole. The way pupils and staff spoke about how she supports and helps all those around her was wonderful to hear

After Mrs Dawn Wilson was diagnosed with breast cancer, she discovered that there are actually 12 symptoms of breast cancer. She then realised she had not one but three symptoms. This was information she needed sooner, and she took it on as her mission for every woman in Wales to not miss this information. Her passion, charisma, and unwillingness not to take "no" for an answer has lead to an incredible amount of people being educated in Wales and beyond.

Astoundingly, Dawn taught nearly 5,000 people in person. Through working with schools, and government organisations, she used her unique talents to engage, educate, and inspire people to do more. She also introduced us to local charity Tenovus, to find a way to distribute our Know Your Lemons 12 symptoms posters to EVERY GP surgery in Wales. Before we could do that however, we had to get the NHS' endorsement for our campaign. So she did! She banged down the doors of the NHS to get them to endorse our campaign, and stood on the footsteps of the Welsh Assembly to launch our campaign across Wales in 2018.

She shared her life and passion for early detection not only with me, or her students, or family and friends, but on ITV with hundreds of thousands of members of the public as she candidly opened up about her diagnosis and struggles and wish to prevent it from happening to someone else. She was determined to take these lemons and make serious lemon-aid. And she did. We will never truly know how many women have discovered—or will discover—their breast cancer early because of Dawn.



With Dawn's permission, we have established a specific fund in her name to continue her work in Wales. To kick off the fund, we are designating £1,500 in her name. It will fund more educators and our campaign efforts to carry out what she has started in schools and with the public. There is still much work left to do and we won't stop until early detection can become a reality for many more.

TEACHER OF THE YEAR WALES

"Local Secondary School, Mary Immaculate celebrates, Teacher of the Year awarded by Welsh Government"

The Professional Teaching Awards Cymru honour the achievements of teachers across the country who are championing success in education while demonstrating the utmost dedication and commitment in the process.

This year, there were 9 awards, all of which are nominated for by the public. All finalists in each of the 9 categories are selected by a national panel of judges who are representatives from the Professional Teaching Awards Cymru. Their role is to judge and score entries according to a specific criterion of an exceptional standard. This is also the second time a teacher at Mary Immaculate has been shortlisted for the award.

Victoria Carey, teacher at Mary Immaculate High School, Cardiff is winner for the 'Teacher of the Year in a Secondary School' category. Along with the award announcement, the Professional Teaching Awards Cymru stated that "Victoria leads with warmth, care and challenge and is always focused on achieving the best outcomes for the young people in her care".

"Her passion and dedication to her subject are infectious, and she has created a love of English with pupils, unlocking their potential and raising pupil aspirations".

On their website, The Welsh Government Education rewards those who display "the qualities of an exceptional secondary school teacher", showing "evidence of being an excellent role model for the younger generation and relentless in getting higher standards".



Victoria said "I feel extremely overwhelmed at winning such an award. This award is not just for me, but all the amazing staff who I have had the pleasure to work with, and who have helped to shape me and my pedagogical practices"

Mary Immaculate has previously been recognised as a centre of excellence and has supported other schools locally and regionally in teaching, learning and leadership. Their mission is to push their students to do their best and promote achievement through hard work and determination, and staff at the school work hard to ensure that their students have the same opportunities as their counterparts in every school in Wales.

Mary Immaculate are proud to have such a brilliant teacher and role model within their midst, Headteacher, Huw Powell said, "We are so proud of Vicky – her work in and outside of the classroom has changed the lives of so many for the better".



COMMUNITY SPIRIT

In any normal year Mary Immaculate usually opens its doors to the senior citizens in the local community, where people are invited into school for a buffet lunch and entertainment. But sadly, due to COVID restrictions in place, this has not happened this year. But, as a School, we felt we wanted to go above and beyond for our senior citizens in the local community because the impact of isolation on the elderly clearly must have been very difficult. So, this year, Mrs Jeffery, who normally co-ordinates the 'Senior citizens Christmas Party' felt that we needed to honour our commitment to our local residents who had clearly gone through a difficult time since March. The school appealed to a number of local organisations -including Cardiff Local Authority, Tesco, LIDL, eteach and Apollo supply agency - who all give generously to the local appeal. As a result, the School has helped prepare a spectacular 294 Christmas hampers for both the senior citizens and vulnerable in the local community. Mrs Jeffery went on to say, 'I am humbled by the efforts both staff and local businesses have gone to in clearly such a difficult and challenging time. I didn't want our local community to feel that they had been forgotten and felt it was important that during such challenging times we remembered the importance of Christmas and the importance of acts of kindness. Headteacher Huw Powell said,

"I am so pleased that in spite of the challenges we have all faced this year, we have been able to offer some support to the most vulnerable. We hope that these hampers show the love our young people have for the wider community – we thank all who have come on the journey with us – we especially thank St Mary's Parish in Canton, Cardiff and the Archbishop of Cardiff, Most Rev George Stack, for their support of this endeavour."

FIRST ONLINE PARENTS EVENING

In line with meeting social distancing requirements, Mary Immaculate High School has just had its very first online parents' evening. This was for parents of year 11 pupils and took place on the 10th of December, and was a very positive experience for all

To enable this to happen the school subscribed to a system call "schoolcloud". This is a product that was tailor made for schools and while not the same as meeting parents physically, does offer many advantages to both parents and teachers. The system is accessible from any modern Internet connected device with a webcam and microphone E.g. laptop or smart phone. The advantages are:

- Allows the parents to book the video appointments themselves;
- Saves time for teachers;
- Make sure all students have appointments during the school year;
- No double bookings of teachers;
- No letters home which can get lost in schoolbags;
- Parent no longer relies on their child to make appointments;

Feed back from parents was all positive, highlighting how easy it was to use. They also enjoyed the relative ease when compared to having to travel onto the school grounds for a normal parents' evening. The other big plus was knowing exactly when your appointment would start and finish.

The staff also gave positive feedback and were really very pleased with the parental engagement. Again the prebooked time slot system meant that teachers could prepare for each pupil and have all relevant information to hand before the appointment began, thus ensuring a quick and to the point meeting with parents was the end result.

With the current COVID situation, there will most likely be more of these online parents' meetings in the future .
