MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD TEACHER

For some, this is the first time in many years they have faced these but I am very proud of the way they have approached all their assessments, including any coursework that they are still completing.

Over the course of the next few weeks these activities will continue. There will be no study leave this year – we felt that having lost so much time in the last two years they needed time to finish courses and

revise. There is an extensive revision schedule every night, through the Easter holidays and in the next (Whitsun) half-term to help them further. Being such a fantastic year group, I know they will take every opportunity to be the best they can be!

Our work around the new curriculum in Wales continues to be part of our planning. Please be assured that normal subjects will remain as we develop a new curriculum for our pupils. As part of that our enrichment curriculum has been met with a really positive response among the pupils – we have been able to offer a wide range from gardening to British Sign Language and cake decoration to First Aid. These are all non-examined and support our wellbeing work with pupils. The enrichment curriculum extends to all pupils in year 9-11 next year.

Preparations also continue for September 2022 and the new year 7s who will join us. Due to large numbers wanting to join Mary Immaculate, we have increased our admission number to 190 (from 159). This means we will become a seven form entry school at least for next year and maybe the year after. This also means we will have to expand our facilities to support these pupils – there are plans for new toilets and a canteen extension to be in place for September 2022. During next academic year we will also be building a new pastoral support hub – this will house our highly regarded Bridge and a number of new counselling and pastoral rooms. This will be

in place for September 2023. All of this shows that what we offer is really prized by our community – it is a privilege to work in and for the local community to offer young people the learning and support they need.

There is more good news from our PE department. In a close fought final, our year 10 boys became the Welsh National Basketball champions for the first time

winning out against much bigger schools. I was so proud of their success and for how they presented themselves at the event. Even our Year 11 boys came close to winning themselves!

Over the course of the next few years our trips and visits will return – including overseas events. Parents evenings may also return to being in

person – it is important as parents you get to meet your child's teachers and see the facilities we have an offer. Other events we hope will also return to normal; we are particularly looking forward to new school productions and end of term liturgies and other events where we can celebrate children's achievements publicly. It was very pleasing that we were able to do that last month at our Eisteddfod celebrations.

We have a small number of staff who are leaving us at Easter. Miss Parry leaves the Maths department and Miss Revoire from Drama and English. Mr Peachey who retired last year but has returned recently to support the school leaves us again. We wish them all the best for the future. After Easter, Miss Attley joins us in a new role working to support post-COVID literacy and numeracy.

I want to wish all our families a happy and holy Easter. School reopens Monday 25th April

Pupils decided to focus on becoming a Rights Respecting School which aims to champion children's rights and explore the 45 Articles outlined in the United Nations Convention on Human Rights.

Rights Respecting School Award



The School Parliament and Rights Respecting steering group have been working hard this term. Having recently completed their 'leadership & listening' training provided by Citizen's Cymru, they have been using their new leadership and listening skills.

Letters have been sent home to all parents / guardians to inform them that Mary Immaculate is pushing forward to become a Right's Respecting School. To date, pupils have engaged in the 45 Articles on the Rights of a Child and have now set a clear action plan.

Targets set including raising awareness across the school through assemblies, academic review and PHSE. Additionally, creating display boards at key points through the school and launching competitions that help us all learn about our human rights and how these rights should be respected.


